I have been pleased to have been involved with some new initiatives this year, many of which the community have been invited to have their say on.



Miscellaneous Licensing works with licensing of taxi drivers to ensure safety of the paying public; they also ensure public safety at events.



She is also a member of Safer Saltash under the Safer Cornwall umbrella and which offers great connectivity with the local Police, community organisations, youth organisations and the new safeguarding lead at Saltash Secondary School.

The only Cornwall councillor who is also a Town Councillor (Essa Ward) and a member of the Town Team she is a keen advocate of collaborative working bringing her considerable knowledge from the hospitality trade into her work as a councillor. She is currently working on a campaign to improve access to retail premises and food outlets for people with mobility issues.





Mid Cornwall - Cynthia

Cynthia is 84-year years old, and lives alone in Mid-Cornwall. The client was referred to a team member at Volunteer Cornwall, as an urgent prevention of hospital admission via Adult Social Care. A request was made for two heaters to be collected and delivered to Cynthia's property as soon as possible - the temperatures were due to plummet below freezing, and Cynthia had no heating at her home.

The Social Worker, who would usually support Cynthia, had tested positive for COVID and they were in isolation to minimise the risk to vulnerable adults. Volunteer Cornwall reacted quickly and were able to connect with a local volunteer, who was able to collect the heaters from Hidden Help - who donate unwanted furniture and household items to those most in need - and delivered them to Cynthia within an hour of being contacted.

When our team member spoke to Hidden Help to arrange the heaters, they also offered Cynthia blankets and hot water bottles. The volunteer sat with Cynthia for over an hour, set up the heaters, and ensured she could operate them safely. The volunteer now visits Cynthia weekly, to check in, have a chat, keep her company, and to spot changes and highlight concerns before a crisis is approached.

Cynthia is vulnerable, but the volunteer said they don't think they have ever met anyone as interesting - Cynthia is a wonderful storyteller. Cynthia is very grateful for our help and for the volunteer's time. Cynthia also said that they would not have been able to cope without the support that has been provided, or that is now in place.

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East Cornwall - Phillip

Phillip is a 60-year-old client who lives alone, with no immediate family, in a remote part of East Cornwall. Phillip had been in Hospital for over 30 days and was recently discharged following a nasty fall at home, a re-ablement package of care was put in place.

At the point the agency were satisfied the client was able to live independently, they contacted the Hospital to Home (H2H) team. Phillip was extremely anxious about the care package ending, and the possibility of another fall and admittance to Hospital. Phillip was understandably concerned as he experiences regular trips and falls.

The team worked with the agency over the course of a few weeks to facilitate a gradual handover, they also arranged for a falls detector lifeline to be installed. During a conversation with Phillip, the team discussed the offer of welfare phone calls due to the remoteness of his property. The team also included the lifeline team in discussions, to establish what could be offered as part of that service. Together, we arranged a lifeline volunteer who would make regular phone calls to check in on Phillip. This arrangement was actioned swiftly, to ensure; that Phillip was maintaining his quality of life, not having falls, and that the equipment was the right fit for his needs.

In addition to this, a referral was made to the Respiratory & Falls Prevention team. They contacted Phillip the same day the referral was submitted, and they are supporting Phillip to build up his strength, balance, and stability. The H2H team have also linked Phillip to their local Social Prescribing Link Worker, who will help link Phillip to other services and activities that could help him with his anxiety.

Phillip also joined Age UK Cornwall's community wellbeing coaches for a Christmas outing, so that he wasn't alone during the festive period.

During a follow-up call, Phillip stated that he felt less anxious knowing that he has a lifeline installed and is now receiving regular welfare calls. He felt more confident about his mobility knowing that he has support measures in place, and he is slowly building up his strength thanks to the Respiratory & Falls Prevention Team - to date, these interventions have prevented a probable readmission to hospital for Phillip.

Community Enterprises PL12 Report to Annual Meeting with Parishioners of Saltash

Community Enterprises PL12 (CEPL12) has had another busy year supporting the PL12 community. For example, it was in April 2023 that our Community Fridge served 755 people, of these, 710 were at our stall in front of the Community Kitchen wherein that month we served 543 customers. These levels have continued throughout the year and are not only supplying those in need but helping to bring footfall into Fore Street.

As to footfall generators No. 4 Fore Street, after a quiet start to the last year, has seen sales increase, as has the number of crafts people who sell their goods through the shop. At the start of the last 12 months, we had 25 crafters and now that number is circa 50. To provide a facility such as this helps crafters in the PL12 community who have an expertise but do not necessarily have the ability to sell their goods.

The Community Kitchen also provides a venue for various support organisations in the community to hold meetings and have friendly chats between people who have similar problems which include mental health groups, a stroke group and Dementia Voice. We were also pleased to announce during the year that Saltash Rotary are now using the venue on a regular basis.

But we don't just have the 2 properties in Fore Street. We were fortunate some years ago to be asked to take on 18 Belle Vue Road and the former toilet building in Belle Vue West car park. In the former we provide a base for Citizen's Advice and Foodbank (the latter also using the former toilet building). We have been negotiating a long term lease of 18 Belle Vue Road and, by the time this report is public, we have now completed the documentation on a 30 year lease of the building.

We are always thankful for our many volunteers and at the present time we have 130 thereof. However, we are always looking for more, including potential new directors.

In recent weeks we have decided to stop the Hopper Bus service. There are, within Saltash, other buses which can provide the same/similar service and it was felt that the time was now right to move on. Once the mainstay of CEPL12 it is now one of the many enterprises with the organisation. Unfortunately, the Director responsible for Transport was ill for several months and then decided to resign and hence the decision, albeit that some of the volunteers did an excellent job of running it during the Director's absence/departure.

In early January we invited Town and Cornwall Councillors to come for afternoon tea at the Community Kitchen and all of those who attended were surprised as to the extent of help we provide in the community with feed those in need, providing a base for social/support groups to meet, operational premises for local charities, a venue for sales by local crafters and a place for volunteers to do good work in the community. We are able to do this because of the various grants/donations we receive but we are always looking for more grants/donations as without them continued operation would be difficult.

Year End Report For Livewire Youth Project 2023

Like most years 2023 was a combination of amazing achievements and some difficult challenges.

Senior sessions 13 to 21 – Livewire delivered open access sessions on Mondays and Thursdays which provide a social meeting place, access to free music lessons, band rehearsal spaces, opportunities to perform and free recording studio facilities. Monday nights we host an open mic session and on Thursdays we encourage young bands to perform on the stage.

Alongside this our team of youth workers and counsellors support a great many young people each session.

Sadly during the year we lost one of our members Abi Eldridge who passed away following an epileptic seizure, her death was felt greatly amongst the young members (her friends) and also the staff team, Abi was a lovely young woman with a great sense of humour, as always in situations like this Livewire really came together to support her friends, family and the staff team.

Junior sessions 10 to 13 – Livewire has also delivered junior sessions over the year. These have been our busiest and sometimes most challenging sessions, leading up to the summer holidays we realised we needed to suspend membership and we have kept the cap on membership since September when we renewed all membership and as sad as we feel having to limit the numbers we feel we can now offer a really safe environment to the local children that come here which is really important. These sessions have been really good fun also and we see 40 plus children getting on to the stage each week to perform.

Young women's music sessions – Our proactive prioritising of young women for music lessons and support has been really beneficial for so many young women over the year, we currently have two young bands. The sessions have gone well and we are currently seeking a new female music lead.

Friday wellbeing sessions – Our Friday well being session is continuing to support a small number of particularly anxious young people, the sessions supported by a youth worker, a musician, a counsellor, a youth support volunteer and Akira the therapy dog. These sessions have gone really well over the past year.

Studio sessions Mondays and Saturdays – Monday evenings and all day Saturdays Will manages our recording studio's to provide young bands and artists the opportunity to record and or learn how to use the recording studio themselves, over the past year we have provided many Saturday sessions and Monday evening sessions for young musicians from all over Devon and Cornwall.

Counselling and mental health support - The counselling team is currently comprised of 7 counsellors with one more due to join us soon. This last year has not been without its challenges but we have got through it and believe we have just scraped the tip of the iceberg in terms of young people's mental health. Our mental

health lead meets with all referrals to chat through their needs and also to check that we have the relevant experience and expertise to meet their needs. Clients typically access 12 sessions of counselling with reviews after 6 weeks but they can extend their sessions up to 18 sessions. Our mental health lead has met regularly with the staff members on the team over the past year to talk through their work and check for any safeguarding issues. This work has also been good over the last year.

New PA – Several months ago through a local music contact an elderly lady donated £10,000 towards a new sound system for our venue.

Our old system was still good and sounded great but it had become old technology and as part of our role within teaching music it had become fairly obsolete as a teaching aid. Following negotiations with Electro Voice (Professional audio manufacturer/supplier they agreed to offer Livewire an unprecedented 60% discount on a new line array system – The cost of the system prior to discount was £60,000 and the discounted price was £25,000, meaning we had a shortfall of £15,000 which amazingly Pete Townshend plugged. The system is now installed and up and running. Giving Livewire the best sounding venue for miles as well as an excellent teaching resource.

Building works – Being good custodians of Livewire, we have had to spend around £10,000 having the lower flat roof above the toilets repaired and most recently around £20,000 on painting the exterior of the building and securing the edge of the main flat roof. Our hope was that once done it would raise the profile of the area which feedback from locals tells us it has.

Boardmasters Festival 2023 – Livewire has again provided entertainment on the keg and pasty stage from 10am till 14.30pm from the Thursday through to the Sunday, this allowed 120 plus young musicians from all over Cornwall to perform, as with last year Livewire allocated the Thursday and the Friday to ASONE acts from various schools.

Regatta 2023 – Livewire as always opened up for the community, to get food and drink during the regatta weekend. We also had three young bands performing on the Jubilee Green stage.

Staffing – During this year we have employed an additional youth worker Sam and due to unforeseen circumstances we needed to replace our mental health lead and now have Lisa who is doing a Stirling job.

Thanks – Lastly we at Livewire are ever grateful for the support we receive locally and from further afield but Saltash Town Council have been very forward thinking in terms of youth work and provide money to ensure that the good work can continue so we thank you. We do honestly believe that without the support from the local community we wouldn't be here so we are truly grateful.



REPORT TO ANNUAL MEETING OF SALTASH TOWN COUNCIL

The volunteers at the Saltash Chamber of Commerce who organise and deliver the Saltash Christmas Festival are delighted to celebrate another successful event, generating an estimated footfall of 5,000 and bringing the community together in the retail heart of the town.

With escalating costs, we tried to cut back on expenditure but delivery of the event still came to just under £10,000. This is a considerable sum for the Chamber to raise, so we are extremely grateful to the Town Council for their grant of £1,500. Additionally, we'd like to thank the council's service delivery team for moving lanterns from Brunel School to the Drill Hall – it was a huge help. Saltash Scrapstore was our other major sponsor again this year. Not only did they donate £2,000 to cover the Lantern Parade, but volunteers at the Pop-up Christmas shop in the Courtyard at the top of town managed to raise £1,750 for the Christmas Festival.

Again, the market proved to be extremely popular with exhibitors as well as the general public, generating just under £2,000 in income for the Festival.

Santas on Bikes 1pm

More than 500 Santas on Bikes parked up on Fore Street as part of their annual ride to Little Harbour Children's Hospice. Although this was an incredible spectacle, it was actually too many bikes as they could not all fit on Fore Street. We are talking with the Santas on Bikes organisers about how to manage this better in 2024. A total of £6,780 was raised for Little Harbour – over £1000 more than the previous year.

Santa Fun Run 2:30pm

200 Santas took part in the third Santa Fun Run, running across the Tamar Bridge and back. China Fleet were the main sponsors this year, and it was another enormous success thanks to meticulous planning and excellent organisation by Tamar Trotters. The later start time worked better, allowing more time and space for Tamar Trotters to prepare after the Santas on Bikes had left for Little Harbour.

Switch on of Christmas Lights and Carol Service 4:30pm

We were delighted that the official switch on of the Christmas Lights by the Mayor and Mayoress of Saltash was brought back in to the Christmas Festival. Immediately following the switch on, Redeemer Church delivered an outdoor Carol Service with children from local primary schools leading the singing. This was greatly enjoyed by the crowds on Fore Street and is an element we hope to build on in 2024.



We created a QR code linking



to the carol song sheet, meaning we could reduce the number of paper copies printed.

The song sheet included messages from the Mayor and the Chair of the Chamber of Commerce.

Redeemer Church also delivered a popular Treasure Hunt with clues in town centre windows.

Lantern Parade 6pm



The Chamber is extremely grateful to Saltash Air Cadets for allowing us to use their Drill Hall as 'Lantern HQ' and for their help with the coordination of the Parade.

Thanks to funding from Saltash Scrapstore, workshops to make lanterns were held in all four Saltash primary schools at no charge to the schools, delivering an opportunity to spread the word about Scrapstore's efforts to minimise the amount going to landfill as well as giving children the opportunity for messy creativity. The Parade was led by a robin made in a workshop at the China Fleet Club with members of the Military Kids Club, a support network for children with a family member serving in the armed forces.

Fireworks

Celebration Pyrotechnics, based in Bodmin, delivered another fantastic display, bringing the Festival to a glorious close.

Window Dressing Competition

Children from Brunel and St Stephens primary schools judged the window dressing competition, with the Chamber Cup being presented to Piglets and the Children's Champion trophy going to West Country Embroidery.

Saltash Radio

In a first for the Christmas Festival, Saltash Radio broadcast live from the trailer stage, which we positioned at the bottom of Fore Street. This proved to be an excellent collaboration as we could deliver announcements, play Christmas music through the loudspeakers, and people who could not get to the Festival were able to tune in from their homes. There were, however, issues with the coverage as some loudspeakers did not work.

Wellness Event

Essentially Balanced delivered an event at the Guildhall focused on massage and wellness. Footfall wasn't particularly high, although the Christmas Festival did fund and deliver leaflets that promoted venues on Lower Fore Street (Guildhall, Heritage Museum, Elliotts) as well as the Christmas Tree Festival at the church of St Nicholas and St Faith.

Fundraising

In addition to grant funding and sponsorship, £1413 was generated for the Christmas Festival from the joint Crowdfunder appeal launched together with the May Fair and Regatta. The raffle prize of £150 was kindly donated by Eclectic Interiors.

ISSUES TO CONSIDER FOR 2024

- Increasing costs and dwindling offers of sponsorship mean raising the funds necessary to deliver the Festival is a major source of concern.
- Storage is needed for the feature lanterns. If we had more storage, we could introduce new lanterns.
- Need to investigate ways of channeling more footfall in to Lower Fore St.
- Loudspeaker coverage was not consistent along the whole of Fore Street
- The Festival is always held on the first Saturday of December, which will be 7th Dec in 2024. Is this too late for a switch-on?

Saltash Environmental Action - Annual Report for Town Council 2023/4

SEA has again had a busy year, in addition to organising its regular stalls at Mayfair and the Regatta, a #EndFossilFuels display for the Library Hub's September environmental month, and frequent newsletters. We were delighted to be chosen as joint recipient of **Mayor's Charity** this year, and have spent the windfall grant on new projects – an ecological survey of Elwell Woods, renewal of the Victoria Gardens wildlife bed, and a pair of can-crushers to help manage the waste problem at outside events.

Allotment SEA was awarded £2,503.19 from the Co-op Community Fund in November 2023. This will fund the reinforcement of the entrance area so that wheelchairs can access the allotment. It has also covered the purchase of two raised planters and a notice-board. These will be added to the wild fruit garden area creating a roll, stroll, sit and pick area for visitors with mobility issues.

The allotment is also the site for the *Eat Your Greens Initiative*. The standard no-dig traditional cultivation bed for 2024 will be laid out in traditional accessible rows of leafy green vegetables, cut and come again varieties that can be used to supplement the diets of food bank users and local people living on low incomes. The food bank offering is high in processed, preserved foods and low in greens and this will help to maintain the general health of users without requiring complicated preparation or cooking.

Great Big Green Week was headed up locally by the Council's Climate Change and Environment Working Group, and SEA organised a litterpick and a tree walk.

Litter Rangers have continued to clean Saltash streets and held a party in the Community Kitchen to celebrate 3 years of activity. Several community litterpicks have been organised.

The **SEA Christmas tree** in St Nicholas this year promoted the multiple benefits of trees: 'A Tree is Not Just for Christmas!'.

Tree Saltash collaborated with May Fair Committee to plant a Coronation Oak in Longstone, the only regret being that local rules prevent it being labelled as such! The volunteers also planted 17 standards around Fairmead, Frobisher Drive, Mulberry Road and Oaklands. This year we have also planted some hedgerow in areas of grassland that are too small to take a standard tree – the aim being that hedgerow will reduce the need for mowing (so carbon-intensive), provide low-maintenance habitat for wildlife, and improve the townscape.

Tree Saltash volunteers also collaborated with *Forest for Cornwall* in planting up Saltmill with large standards; and in their *Free Trees* project, which handed out about 300 whips to Saltash residents, the first time this has been offered in Saltash.

The series of **Winter public meetings** were held at Isambard House, which SEA used as guests of the Council's Climate Change and Environment Working Group. Meetings

focussed on Electric Vehicles, Recycling, the Cornish film 'A Year in a Field' (in collaboration with Forder Film Club) and Stopping Draughts. The March meeting will promote the bioWATCH project to be launched in April by the Library Hub, and the April meeting will discuss the toxic plastic crisis.

We also arranged two **farm visits**: Tim Williams is regenerative farming at Erth Barton and Purdy at the adjacent farm is actively restoring Nature.

Wildflower meadows in Pillmere and the cemetery had another difficult year with the weather severely affecting growth and flowering during the critical early Summer. A cold April was followed by hot, dry May/June, on top of a drought since the previous Autumn, followed by heavy and persistent rain for the rest of Summer and Autumn. SEA has worked with Cormac at Latchbrook Valley. Volunteers this year have included new SEA members and employees of Hemsley Frazer.

SEA is working on new projects: wildlife 'green corridors' in Saltash; Elwell Woods as an urban nature reserve; and renewal of nature-friendly bed in Victoria Gardens. Any interested local resident is welcome to join in. Find us on www.seasaltash.org.uk and Facebook.

Saltash Heritage Museum & Local History Centre 2024 Report to Annual Meeting with Parishioners of Saltash

In respect of 2023, Saltash Heritage had an incredibly busy year. What's new. We have maintained our level of volunteers around the 53 mark. It seems that if someone leaves it is always through illness or death, our amazing volunteers do stay with us, of which we are very proud. We always welcome new faces and it seems someone always pops in the door and fills a gap. We do not have a limit to the number of volunteers who wish to work with us. Many work from home doing transcription work, as they have limited mobility or are caring for someone at home. Others are out in the community setting up external exhibitions, or giving talks. Many are our Front of house welcome committee and the research and exhibition team, work behind the scenes not only when the museum is open but out of hours. We welcome visitors for private visits, particularly dementia groups, nursing homes and special needs children's group. All these require a quiet and safe venue and we book them in for their visit on a day we are closed to the general public to ensure their safety. We have handling boxes which are taken out by a volunteer, to schools, nursing homes and halls for people to handle and discuss.

We had over 2000 visitors to our last years exhibition, for which we won a Heritage award, constructing a green exhibition, using all recycled materials. We won an award for the Object of the year at the Cornwall Heritage Awards with our Cradle-boat, built in Mashfords yard in the 1920's.

We receive many enquiries from abroad and our research team constantly spend hours over documents and books trying to assist these visitors who challenge us frequently.

After our closure of the ground floor exhibition in December the research room continues to work right through the winter period, whilst the exhibition team prepare for the 2024 new exhibition, this year it will be an Art theme based on the work of Henry Martin, a Newlyn artist who migrated to Saltash, where he brought up his family. The team are involving family members, art critics, the owners of the art work of Henry Martin and the owners of the property he lived in. We hope to have the fullest amount of information by the time we open in April.

Regatta Reflections – Chairs report

Regatta 29th & 30th July 2023

Karen Lilley, Chair and Aaron Monk (Diverse Events CIC) along with the volunteers organising the annual Regatta and Waterside Festival would like to share that the actual event was a great success. However, it has to be noted that financially, it was the hardest year we have had. We were rejected by a number of sponsors and grants and had to set up a Community fundraiser through Crowdfunder to raise the capital needed as a combined fundraiser with the Christmas Festival and Mayfair. The target of £15000 was reached but we had to use money from other pots to achieve this or we would have not been able to keep the money we raised. Unfortunately the target amount was less than the cost to run this event so we are in a deficit.

Sponsorship was sourced in the main from Saltash Town Council, which we were extremely grateful for, in addition to the Crowdfunder and South West Surfacing Specialists LTD. Financial contributions were also gained from Cornwall Councilors, Carlton Plastics, the Sue Hooper Charitable Foundation, Grove Nurseries Boarding Kennels, Infinite, and a small number of businesses locally. Raising money is becoming a great concern, we have already applied and been rejected for 2024 through the Scops Art Trust.

Our other challenge is support to run the event. We have not been able to find volunteers, leaving the main tasks of fundraising, managing the event, organising the entertainment and all marketing down to one and a half volunteers. As always the expertise of Diverse Events for event management plans, stall bookings (amongst many other things) has been invaluable. The money raised through stall bookings increases every year and contributes to the costs. This year it was just under £5500. We could also not have had other key activities such as the Cardboard boat race, Paddle board relay and Treasure Hunt without the support of Redeemer Church, Saltash. Hilary Frank helped with several aspects and always offers a great deal of advice and practical support, using her experience running other key events in the town. We have lost our Royal Navy support and had to rely on very young Marshalls from the Air Cadets and

Barne Barton Community Ambassadors, who manned road blocks etc, they were committed and invaluable but also inexperienced, which is not always a good representation of such a large event.

Other crucial supporters included Mike Pitches Photography and Community Enterprises, PL12. The shuttle bus service was very well received and was at no cost to Regatta as donations were given by users. We have had feedback to say that this really increased footfall to Fore Street.

The Saltash service deliver team was really helpful throughout every stage of the preparations and the event itself, as was the Town Clerk.

A huge thanks to the Mayor at the Civic and Children's Parade. The Mayor opened the event and supported as much as possible. Having the event in the summer holidays was not very successful in terms of numbers; we hope this will be improved upon in the future.

Saltash Town Band led the procession safely to the Waterside, where prizes were handed out. We were very grateful to the Sue Hooper Charitable Foundation who funded the band.

The Regatta Relay Paddle board race was well supported, as was the glorious Paint Party and the thrills and spills of the Cardboard Boat Race. Once again Admiral Mike was our esteemed judge. Jon and Dee White, along with their team of volunteers from Redeemer Church, have been organising this infamous spectacle for six years now and do a fantastic job. They also created a fun Treasure Hunt and gave out prizes.

A huge thanks to SEA and the litter rangers who worked hard to keep the site clean.

We had a new addition this year with Saltash Radio covering the whole event. This was a real asset to Regatta. Saltash Radio is a new initiative, supported by Saltash Town Council.

We were fortunate to have an undercover bar area provided by Born Hectic events which was needed when the rain inevitably came!

We had a new set up with the stage positioning, which was also successful. Having the stage on Jubilee Green created more seating and comfort. It also stopped queues for food vendors blocking Old Ferry Road as we moved them to the car park.

We could not find a free recycling service this year for the boats, so had to use our budget for the removal of cardboard.

Once again, Saltash Environmental Action worked to keep the area spotlessly clean.

The future date for Regatta has been set for 13th and 14th July 2024, this date came through negotiations with Caradon Gig rowers, Saltash Sailing Club and Born Hectic, who run the bar.

We could not have run this event without the financial support received by Saltash Town Council but it has to be stated quite clearly that we made a loss this year despite every effort. The future is not secure for this event and manpower is extremely low.

As the Chair I would very much like to explore and investigate ways to change our entity to a CIC or CIO. Ideas include having Saltash Community Events CIO, this would have all 3 key events under one umbrella company and share the responsibilities and liabilities, as they stand now. I am hoping to get support for this and practical advice through the Growth Hub. This is not by decision to make alone, but is definitely something I will propose. That said, if we keep having funding bids rejected and do not get any further help, we will not be able to hold the Saltash Regatta in 2024. This would be a great loss to our community. I was planning my own retirement after 13 years involvement, but I am not convinced there is anyone I can pass it on to!

To offer a weekend event across Fore Street, Victoria Gardens and Longstone Park that is free admission, and involves a range of local performers, musicians, traders and charities.

Through the street market, wellbeing activities (including running races and outdoor fitness sessions) and live music on Longstone Park, the May Fair boosts footfall into the retail heart of the town centre, offers local musicians the opportunity to showcase their talent, offers local community groups the platform to raise funds and awareness, promotes health and wellbeing, boosts community pride and fosters community cohesion.

Our additional objective in 2023 was to give Saltash a platform to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III.

The May Fair is organised by a group of volunteers comprising:

Hilary Frank (Treasurer) Tanya Hatch Adam Webb

We have excellent collaboration with the volunteers from Tamar Trotters, and particularly Colin Bunting who organise the running events on the Sunday of May Fair weekend.

Highlights on Saturday 6th included:

- Market the length of Fore Street
- Coronation Civic Parade with Parade of Youth, with Guest of Honour James Kitson, Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall
- Youth Village in Victoria Gardens
- Free, live music in Longstone Park until 9pm

Highlights on Sunday 7th included:

- Half Marathon, 5K and Fun Run, with over 400 runners
- Outdoor climbing wall
- Outdoor fitness sessions (dance, yoga, etc.)
- Coronation Big Lunch
- Dog Show

Heavy overnight rain on Friday evening meant that the entrance to Longstone Park was a mud bath on Saturday morning, causing issues for traders who had not set up on Friday. We tried to mitigate the impact by asking as many traders as possible to park in the car park, and volunteers carried their goods on to Longstone Park, but some of the catering vans had no choice but to drive on to the Park, leaving muddy ruts. We took remedial action after the event, and the ground recovered within a couple of weeks.

Happily, the worst of the rain cleared just in time for the Parade. We are extremely grateful to all the youth groups and civic dignitaries who braved the mizzle to take part. Hearing the National Anthem and Trelawny being sung with such gusto by the crowds on Fore Street was a moving experience.

More than 100 stalls set up for the street market. The crowds were quiet in the morning, but picked up once the Coronation itself was over and the sun came out.

The atmosphere on Longstone Park for the live music on Saturday evening was fabulous with the crowds loving the bands and the new location for the stage, which gave a fantastic backdrop.



Tamar Trotters worked extremely hard and efficiently to deliver running races on the Sunday. The races were excellently organised, earning well-deserved praise from runners.



The Big Lunch on Sunday was an excellent addition to the weekend, with RwindBand delighting the crowds and the MP.

Organisers are particularly grateful to Saltash Town Council, as well as to other grant funders and sponsors, for their financial support enabling us to create memories to last a lifetime. We were pleased that the Mayor and Mayoress attended the commemorative tree planting in November in Longstone Park.

Who benefitted from the project?

The event attracted over 6,000 visitors from Saltash and surrounding areas over the two days.

It delivered a positive impact to local businesses, bringing visitors to Saltash and promoting our town to a wider audience.

It offered free entertainment, helping families who may be struggling in the current cost of living crisis and boosting community cohesion.

It offered a platform for local musicians to perform.

Local charities and community groups (Approx. 50) Local business taking a stall (Approx. 50) Youth groups (Approx. 10)

What sponsorship did you receive for this project?

We worked hard, in collaboration with the organisers of Saltash Regatta and Christmas Festival, to pull together a sponsorship booklet that was hand-delivered to businesses on the industrial estates as well as town centre businesses. Thankfully, this generated increased sponsorship compared to previous years.

We were awarded just under £2,000 from Cornwall Community Foundation (Howton Solar Farm) to promote environmental measures at the May Fair, including packets of wildflower seeds given to children completing a little litter pick or Treasure Hunt, and the planting of a commemorative tree in Longstone Park.

Fore Street businesses donated prizes for a raffle that raised over £400.

Sale of tickets in the cash raffle generated over £700.

Over £5000 was brought in through stalls.

Cornwall Councillors granted over £1000 to cover the costs of the Big Lunch music and the outdoor Climbing Wall.

We went over budget by £3000. Much of this was due to increased costs post-Covid, a situation being experienced by all event organisers throughout the country.

Also, though, in recognition of the fact that May Fair coincided with the coronation of King Charles III, we spent extra on aspects such as outdoor screens to broadcast the Coronation. We are grateful to STC for donating £1,500 to help cover the costs of the big screens, but we took the decision to increase the entertainment budget in recognition of the historic nature of the occasion and:

- Invited Saltash Town Band to lead the civic parade
- Had stiltwalkers dressed as Royal Guardsmen to entertain the crowds
- Gave volunteers a commemorative flask with the coronation logo
- Had the May Fair logo redesigned to incorporate the official coronation logo
- Invited RwindBand to play at the Big Lunch

Combined with the expenditure on screens, this was a total of £3,800.


We put extra efforts in to fundraising, and the revenue generated means that the shortfall for 2023 can be covered by the amount we had in the bank at the beginning of the year. It does, however, put us in a precarious funding position with hardly any financial cushion for May Fair 2024.

Visit Tamar Valley

As a Destination Marketing Organisation our primary focus is on promoting the Tamar Valley as a not to be missed destination in the southwest to the short-stay visitor market. The Tamar Valley has a unique appeal that we strive to differentiate from the big counties of Devon and Cornwall. We're very aware that too many people coming to the southwest don't know what the area has to offer and it gets overlooked. We're working to change that!

Our operation and marketing activity is entirely dependent on membership revenue. Our town membership costs £300 per year and includes all of the following benefits:

- a 12-month image and video focussed listing on our Destination website www.visittamarvalley.co.uk As an example, please see: Plymouth
- participation in targeted marketing campaigns throughout the year
- features on social media and in visitor newsletters
- dedicated articles in our blog
- participation in collaborative marketing campaigns with neighbouring Destination Marketing Organisations
- access to quality business and marketing resources and expertise
- access to member events and networking

What's more, our work is being underpinned at the moment by some fantastic resources. Visit Tamar Valley works closely with the Tamar Valley National Landscape (formerly the AONB) to deliver the Come Visit Stay Awhile project, one of ten that make up the Tamara Landscape Partnership Scheme. The project, with its focus on stimulating an increase in visitor numbers and opportunities for local businesses, amounts to one of the most exciting opportunities for tourism businesses in the Tamar Valley for many decades. The scope of the project includes:

- o Further developing the Visit Tamar Valley website
- o marketing the Tamar Valley as a place to visit
- Promoting hospitality and tourism businesses in the area
- o Creating opportunities for local people to become involved in the industry
- Upskilling local business through workshops and training
- o Creating a dedicated B2B support hub for local business owners

In sharp focus during 2024/25 and beyond are group travel and sustainable tourism. Visit Tamar Valley is currently creating a group travel section for the website, together with itinerary information. We will also be exhibiting at the British Travel & Tourism Show at Birmingham NEC on 20th and 21st March.

We're working with the SECTA's Green Acorn scheme this year and next to support businesses that wish to develop their sustainable processes and practices further. The project will support a portfolio of tourism businesses to become 'green ambassadors' feeding in to a sustainable tourism charter for the Tamar Valley next year.

Whilst town membership includes all the aforementioned benefits, in practice, it works as partnerships with Visit Tamar Valley where we can become the voice of tourism for the town. With a town's tourism objectives leading the way, we work with Town Councils to help develop a marketing plan that includes much more effective use of the town's page on the Visit Tamar Valley website, publishes dedicated newsletters about the town in question, hosts bespoke competitions through our channels, writes dedicated blogs about a town, and ensures the town is featured on all our channels throughout the year'

Visit Tamar Valley would like to ask members to consider reinstating their membership to Visit Tamar Valley.



The Core Youth Project End of year report to Saltash Town Council – February 2024

Our mission statement is;

'The Core aims to provide young people with opportunities and activities which help build positive relationships, strengthen and develop self esteem/confidence and empower them to have a positive impact on their community'

What the money has been spent on and what has been delivered.

The money that Saltash Town Council awarded The Core Youth Project continues to employ our Youth Work Coordinator who manages and develops the youth provision at the centre. We have a staff team of 1 full time youth worker, 4 part time Youth Support Workers and 1 Trainee Youth Worker which has enabled us to continue to a wide variety of youth work sessions. The following projects are funded by STC and the match funding we have secured from other grants.

The following sessions are offered weekly at The Core for young people;

Open Access Youth Sessions

Senior club for 13-18 year olds every Monday evening 7-9pm Junior club for 11-13 year olds every Thursday evening 6.30-8.30pm

Grub Club

Cooking workshop every Monday 3.15-5pm (Years 7-13)

Craft Club

Arts and crafts workshop every Thursday 3.15-4.30pm (Years 7-13)

Just be You

LGBT+ support and social group every Monday 3.15-4.30pm

Home Education Group

Monday's fortnightly 10.30-12.30pm for parents and children who are home educated.

Climbing Club - Every Wednesday and Friday 3.30-6pm for children aged 5-18

Saltash Amateur Boxing Club - Every Wednesday and Friday evening

We currently offer positive activities for young people 5 afternoons/evening of the week.

Alterative Provision Project

Our new project has just been launched in partnership with Groundwork South

West and is for young people who are not accessing education or who are home educated and would like to have access to accredited learning. We have started with a group of young people aged between 13-17 who have been referred from either parents or the Targeted Youth Work Team. They participate in a 6 weeks programme which includes workshops such as cooking, boxing, drama, art and employability support and also have access to functional skills where they can do English and Maths level 1 & 2 to support them to achieve qualifications for their next steps.

In addition to this we are also working with Groundwork to deliver the National Citizenship Service (NCS) programme and have signed 19 young people up to this. We are working with them on employability, lifeskills and social action.

Match funding

Good Growth Fund (through partnership work with Groundwork) = £25,000 Police and Crime Commissioner - £4997

Total = £29,997 + subscriptions from youth club sessions.

In house funding

- Weekly subscriptions for youth club
- Revenue from room hire at the centre Approx. £25,000 per year. Whilst
 this money is essentially raised to pay for the general running costs and
 other staffing costs, it does show that we are bringing in revenue to help
 keep the centre open for both the community and the young people.
- Fundraising and donations We hold regular events for families, craft fairs, toddler group and our community cafe which all help to bring in much needed revenue.

Outcomes and outputs achieved

Total current number of members at The Core = 300

Number of open access sessions delivered 2023/24 = 213

Number of young people receiving individual support = 25

Number of young people helped back in to employment, training or work = 12

Number of youth volunteer hours worked = 800-900 hours over the last year.

Youth Work

Our sessions continue to be well attended which is evidence that young people need places to go and socialise and take part in activities. It is essential that youth centre's continue to open their doors and provide professional youth work, a safe and non-judgmental space, advice and information and most importantly...fun!

It is so important that we can offer young people not only a safe space to meet and socialise but also a range of support and activities to keep them healthy and happy and ensure that we make our programme diverse and interesting. Our programme offers; Cooking courses, Craft club, a range of sporting activities, LGBT+ support group, 1:1 advice and guidance, Sexual health advice, training and volunteering opportunities.

Alongside all the structured activities we offer we are also able to offer professional youth work support, advice and guidance. This year has been particularly challenging as we have seen an increase in poor mental health amongst our membership. As a staff team we have all felt the strain of supporting young people through some very significant events in their lives and have worked more with outside agencies to seek the appropriate support for those young people with more complex needs.

We offer various opportunities for young people to volunteer and have a reliable and committed team who regularly help at our Junior Youth Club and LGBTQ+ group and also our Youth Committee who we support to organise their own fundraising activities and also continue to ensure that young people stay central to the work that we do and their voices are heard.

The young people are supported to work their way up from being a member to becoming a volunteer and we also offer a paid Trainee Youth Worker position each year to a young person who we feel has shown the most commitment and promise to become part of the youth work team.

A vast majority of the young people who attend our sessions have experienced difficulties at school, have chaotic and sometimes unsafe home lives, are young carers, suffer with mental health problems, such as anxiety, low mood or self harm, are transgender or questioning their sexuality, have experienced bullying, are looked after children, suffer with autism/aspergus syndrome or have a disability (learning or physical) or are just finding the transition from childhood to adulthood difficult and need some support.

We work with a great deal of young people who have been through traumatic events in their lives and are experiencing a complexity of problems, by providing them with a safe space to come and access to professionally trained youth workers they have begun to increase in confidence and develop as individuals. We have seen an increase in young people requiring specialist support from agencies such as CAMHS and the Early Help Team due to their poor mental

health, especially amongst our LGBTQ+ group.

Our Youth Work Coordinator is a qualified Trauma Informed practitioner, which has helped in supporting those young people with more complex needs.

We have seen an increase in young people becoming home educated and also those who have developed anxiety and are refusing to go to school since the pandemic. This has given the basis to the new project in partnership with Groundwork as we know there is a gap in provision for young people to access functional skills and an alternative to traditional schooling.

Our successful partnership working with a range of outside agencies and local organisations has meant that we are able to offer more opportunities and activities for the young people we work with. We continue to work closely with Safer Saltash, Saltash Community School, Intercom Trust, Early Help Team and Social Care, Police, Saltash Health Centre, Young People Cornwall, Saltash Town Youth Council and local town events.

Case Study

We have a young man who attends our LGBTQ+ group every Thursday who is 16 years old. He has been coming for over a year now and when we first met him he was not in school, had not been in education since the age of 9 and was very isolated and had no social life. He is autistic and also struggles with depression, he finds large groups and noise challenging. We have seen such a significant change in him since he has been access the group; he has develop his social skills and talks to other members now instead of sitting by himself. He will access youth workers for support and will ask for help when he is feeling low and struggling. He has understood that he needs to use appropriate language around some of our younger members now which shows how far he has come in terms of being part of a group and understanding the boundaries and exercising respect for the other members.

We have referred him for one to one support from a local agency that are helping him with his next steps and looking at courses for him to access with a view to him being employable. We are extremely proud of how far he has come and how much he now enjoys the social aspect of the group.

We hope it is evident from this report that the funding which we receive from Saltash Town Council is essential in enabling us to continue to provide and develop a professional and innovative service to the young people of Saltash and the surrounding villages. We would like to thank the Council for supporting the youth work we offer.

Safer Saltash Year to Date Summary 2023/24

The aim of Safer Saltash is to **improve community safety and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour** by targeting resources to the people and places that need it most within the geographical area, and working with **communities**, **partners and the business and voluntary sectors** to develop **sustainable solutions**.

Safer Saltash facilitates and supports a coordinated multi-agency approach to community safety issues to improve feelings of safety and public reassurance, reduce the risk of harm to the community and protect vulnerable groups.

Safer Saltash actively involves community members in the work of the partnership and encourages social inclusion and community resourcefulness through being part of the problem-solving process and having a sense of pride in Saltash. Achieving safer communities depends upon everyone working together to find local solutions to local problems.

This group is now in its sixth year and has developed a comprehensive work plan based on the evidence presented in the previous Saltash Town Profile and feedback from the Residents Survey. Safer Saltash has identified the following community safety priorities for the town:

Reported Crime

The following information is based on the 12-month period ending November 2023.

There are high percentage increases for arson, bike theft, robbery and theft from the person- although there have been increases the numbers are low meaning that percentage changes are volatile.

The numbers are low, but there has been an increase in rape offences in the town- of these offences 8 are linked to domestic abuse and 6 of those are of a historical nature.

There has been an increase in other theft- this increase is greater than that seen across the rest of Cornwall. Miscellaneous crimes against society have also increased when compared with the previous year.

On the whole crime rates in Saltash are lower than the Cornwall average. The 4% increase in the town can be attributed to the increase in other theft. Violent crimes have remained stabled when compared with the previous year.

Safer Saltash Delivery 2023/24

Safer Saltash continues to meet every 4 weeks to ensure that regular dynamic intelligence and updates about emerging community safety, crime and antisocial behaviour across the town is fed in and acted upon.

This year we have;

- continued to address pockets of antisocial behaviour in the town through a balance of support and enforcement measures;
- run 'Bystander' training with staff from the licenced premises,
- targeted work at the Waterside to address specific concerns;
- delivered several environmental visual audits in various locations in the town. These audits
 involved a number of partners from a raft of different agencies, coming together to assess the
 physical space and agreeing actions to improve the area in line with situational crime
 prevention strategies;
- we have worked with civil enforcement partners to focus activity in hotspot locations;

- advocated for the implementation of a live monitored CCTV system in Saltash;
- worked in partnership with the local youth provision organisations and Saltash Community School to bring in improvements for young people and their families and facilitated the sharing of intelligence with organisations responsible for road safety.

During National Hate Crime Week in October 2023, Safer Saltash delivered a 'Say NO to Hate Crime' campaign with over 65 businesses, traders and organisations in the town. Hundreds of windows in Saltash town centre, taxis and community buses are now displaying the Safer Cornwall 'Say NO to Hate Crime' sticker that also contains a QR code to the Devon and Cornwall Police reporting hate crime page. This is the first stage of a wider hate crime initiative that will feature a celebration of diversity event in the New Year that will aim to bring together Saltash residents to celebrate difference through food, music and sport.

It can take many forms and includes psychological, physical, sexual, financial and emotional abuse, stalking, so-called 'honour'-based abuse, forced marriage and the illegal practice of Female Genital Mutilation.

Sexual violence and abuse

Sexual violence and abuse is a broad term describing all sexual offences against adults and children. It occurs when the person is forced, coerced or deceived into sexual acts against their will or without their consent. Sexual violence and abuse can happen to anyone in our community. It does not have to be a single act, but can occur as part of a continuum of attitudes and actions.

Worried about a child?

The Multi-Agency Referral Unit (MARU) provides a multi-disciplinary response to concerns about the welfare or safety of a child or young person in line with statutory guidance from Our Safeguarding Children Partnership for Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. The multi-disciplinary team also provides advice and guidance to parents and professionals about the wide range of services available to children and families in Cornwall. TOWN TEAM REPORT FOR PARISHIONERS MEETING

The Town Team has had a busy last 12 months.

At the beginning we were involved in the public consultation by HIVE, our appointed consultants, into the future for our town centre.

Following consultation, including public presentations, a report was prepared which highlighted certain issues including the need for one large open space (town square) but consideration should be given to a few smaller spaces linking the area together and improving connectivity in the creation of a vibrant green realm in the heart of the town.

Town Team then decided to pursue the ideas relating to the central area of Fore Street as the financial reality of trying to pursue, initially, larger ideas proved insurmountable. We were then fortunate in securing a further £21,000 grant from the accelerator fund to enable ideas to formulate re. having street markets.

At the same time, we have submitted an application for a grant of £30,000 from the Delivery

Fund which, if successful, will enable some ideas re. the 'greening etc.' of this central area to come to fruition.

In March we will be further consulting with retailers to ascertain their opinions on our proposals before instigation so that any concerns they have may be addressed.

Whilst the above has been happening we have put on hold our ideas for promotional leaflets and banners so that, if necessary, we can tie them in with the activities in Fore Street.

Initially, a few of us got together to celebrate Ukranian's Independence Day with some of the refugees and during that celebration we were asked if craft could be offered on a regular basis to sell and raise funds for medical supplies for Ukraine via Outreach Paramedics.

Funds were raised through the sale of our crafts at many events including Saltash May Day, Saltash Regatta, plant sales and seasonal events.

Crafts that have been made by the group include tie dyeing, paper marbling, jewellery making, air dry clay items and other crafting activities.

Since the beginning of the fundraising we have raised over £4000 for Outreach Paramedics.

Thanks have to be made to Stephanie Hurrell for being instrumental in starting the group alongside Jenny Waycott, Jo Baskott and Kathy Fox. Particular thanks to Jo and Jenny for all their efforts in securing funds for the group to assist the Ukranian refugees to be intergrated within the community. Eighteen families benefitted from the group. Pysanka Crafts has been very successful in it's objectives as many refugees no longer attend as they have gone on to settle well into the community and many have jobs and their own accommodation.

The Core was instrumental in getting the group up and running, allowing the group to meet on their premises in the beginning.

Our current meeting place, Saltash Wesley Church, can no longer afford us storage space so a solution is being looked into.

As we currently have no Ukrainian refugees attending the group we have decided to close the group down. We are ensuring all relevant points, as per our constitution, are being met re closing the group.

After Easter we will set up a new group with a new name and new objectives. The main objective will be to raise funds for local charities (chosen by the management committee).

Saltash Foodbank - Report to Annual Meeting with Parishioners of Saltash

The foodbank is pleased to be asked again to report to the Council's Annual Parishioners' Meeting. Saltash Foodbank is a Trussell Trust Foodbank and provides 3 days' worth of food for a balanced diet, to those that are experiencing a financial crisis, on receiving a referral from a Support Agency.

Since our Report last year and with the ongoing cost of living crisis, we have seen an increased demand for our services. We have over 55 volunteers, an increase on other years, due to an increase in the need for our services. We have no paid staff. Last year we supported 589 household referrals (548 in 2022), comprising 863 adults and 636 children, so a total of 1,499 individuals (1,408 in 2022) with at least 3 days of food.

Saltash Foodbank received the most referrals in 2023 from Plymouth Job Centres (84), Help Through Hardship (Citizens Advice / Trussell Trust Helpline - started during Covid19) (72) and Christians Against Poverty - CAP (45). The main reason given by many was Low Income, until 4th March 2023 from when we collected more detailed information from the referrers on our database. Currently, the 3 main reasons are 'Rising Cost of Essentials', people having 'Ongoing Impact of Physical and Mental Health Issues' and 'Priority Debt', such as Rent or Council Tax arrears.

Saltash Foodbank received over 39 tons (40.5 tons in 2022) of food last year from supermarket donation points, supermarket collections, community groups, churches and items such as bread, fruit and veg from supermarkets themselves just past their best-before date and items slightly damaged packaging. We distribute food parcels to people directly and if we have a surplus of certain items, we also support school breakfast and afterschool clubs, charities, other food organisations and local foodbanks, to prevent items on our shelves going out of date.

During December our Support Agencies and our volunteer drivers distributed to 138 households a Christmas Hamper with Christmassy food items and added surplus food items. This supported 202 adults and 205 children with an additional gift for each person. These families were offered a hamper via our many Referral Agencies. We had great community support last year when Saltash Rock Choir, Saltash Community Fire Station and Pentillie Castle did large collections for us, as did many other individuals, groups and businesses. We could not provide our Christmas Food Hampers without the support of our local Community. In addition to the Christmas Hampers in December, we also managed to provide regular food support to the clients referred to us. December is always a busy month for Foodbanks and we are blessed to have the use of our overflow store in the other Belle Vue Road car park, to allow us to distribute the hampers from there.

Further Support

Due to our small premises, we struggle to have confidential conversations with clients about their circumstances at Lower Ground Floor, 18 Belle Vue Road, so our growing team of Signposting Volunteers call those who have received a food parcel, to discuss their situation and signpost them to further support. Virtual Signposting allows us to speak to people over the phone at a less stressful time and see if they need further Signposting, especially to let them know about activities happening locally in Saltash. We are pleased to have organisations such as 'Saltash Community Fridge' and 'Warm Spaces' at Wesley Church that are helping many people access extra support. New last year, we can also refer people in crisis to Kremena, our Citizens Advice advisor who directly links with Saltash Foodbank on Fridays, to see priority clients, to help them to improve their financial situation. This is funded by a 'Financial Inclusion' grant from the Trussell Trust. This has been a great help to many people already, to help improve their situation.

This winter has been especially challenging, with clients facing increased costs with energy, food, rent and mortgages, leaving some with a negative budget, even after support from Citizens Advice and CAP (Christians Against Poverty).

Our Freephone number continues to be funded by grants from the Cornwall Community Foundation and is manned most days. This has been a great help to those struggling with their bills, asking for help. We can also help people with their phone data and calls due to free SIMs from network providers via the Good Things Foundation. We have also been able to use grant funding to purchase a few basic mobile phones to support those unable to contact, for example, their Support Agencies.

Our Concerns for The Future

We continue to worry how the cost-of-living crisis is affecting people's health - both physical and mental. There is an increase in dampness and mould in homes as people cannot afford to heat their homes properly. Then there is the housing crisis, with people sofa-surfing, often for many years, before they are provided with social housing, and people in temporary accommodation waiting for months to be homed. These are 'the hidden homeless'. We could see more of these as rents have increased recently and income has not kept up with the increase. We are also aware of people sleeping in cars, boats, and other unsuitable shelters in Saltash. Many of these are supported by us, Saltash Wesley Church, Saltash Baptist Church, Cornwall Council and St Petroc's.

We are still appealing for the creation of a 'social supermarket' or 'cooperative food hub' in Saltash as many people we see, wish to be independent and do not want to rely on charity for their food. We hope there will be a type of 'social supermarket' in Saltash, to allow those on a low-income to purchase food at low cost. This is especially needed if government support with energy is soon to be withdrawn - with people already struggling to afford the essentials. Ideally, benefits need to be increased to cover the rise in inflation, hence our support in the last year of the Trussell Trust and Sir Joseph Rountree Foundation 'Guarantee Our Essentials' campaign, which has recently been presented to No.10 Downing Street.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to all the foodbank volunteers, old and new, who are making a huge difference to those we support. A BIG thank you to the community for continuing to support us. I would especially like to thank the Foodbank Trustees for their support and hard work to support those in need; especially Richard (Chair of Trustees), Jill (Treasurer and Trustee), Charles (Special Projects and Trustee), Corina (Secretary and Trustee), Ruth (Warehousing), Jackie (Signposting and Trustee), Sara (Agency and Trustee), Revd. Di (Churches Together and Trustee), Kathryn (Volunteering and Trustee) and Elizabeth (Trustee). I could not do this without you all.
