Who benefitted from the project?	The event attracted over 7,000 visitors from Saltash and surrounding areas over the two days.

What sponsorship did you receive for this project?

For the second year running, we worked with the organisers of the Regatta and Christmas Festival to create a sponsorship booklet that was hand-delivered to businesses on the industrial estates as well as the town centre. It did not generate as much income as the first edition, but was still worthwhile.

Fore Street businesses donated prizes for a raffle that raised over £250.

Sale of tickets in the May Fair cash raffle generated £1010.

Over £5000 was brought in through stalls.

Cornwall Councillors granted £800.

Tamar Trotters shared some of the expenses for medical services and toilets, as well as donating £660.

COMMENTS ON THE BUDGET

Overspend:

Volunteers

We are extremely grateful to staff at Saltash Community School for encouraging a large number of students to come along to help out. The students were great ambassadors for their school. We gave each of them vouchers to spend at the food stalls on Longstone Park, and as there were more students than we had originally planned for, we ended up spending more on volunteer expenses. Definitely worthwhile, though! Especially as the vouchers were spent at the on-site food vendors, boosting their income.

Entertainment

The stage on Longstone Park offers local musicians, such as young people from Livewire, the opportunity to play on a big stage and brings people together, so we are keen to expand on the 'music festival' element of May Fair. We therefore cut down on other



entertainment (such as stilt walkers) in order to spend more on the music. We still went over budget, however, because we decided to hire a well-known ABBA tribute act, as part of our Saltash tribute to 2024 being the 50th year of ABBA winning the Eurovision Song Contest. The extra expenditure was a worthwhile investment as it generated a great 'buzz', giving us a good platform to build on in coming years.

Underspend:

Medical

We compared quotes from various providers, hoping to secure medical services for a lower sum than the original quote of £1800, and were pleased to find an excellent company who charged £1200.

Security

We ended up spending less on security than originally thought because our estimates were based on the 2023 May Fair, and it wasn't until after submitting the application to STC that we remembered we had spent extra on security in 2023 as May Fair had been held on the same day as the Coronation when there was a need for heightened security.

Wellness Instructors and Sports Day

We had been hoping to introduce a traditional 'Sports Day' event on the Sunday of the event. In the end, we didn't have enough capacity to organise this, and we decided to use this money on the music festival instead. (It turned out to be a good decision at it rained a lot on Sunday...)

Extra expenditure not included in the budget at the time the application was submitted:

PRS Licence

After investigation and discussions with other community festivals, we paid £210 for a PRS licence. This was not in our original budget, but the payment will directly support musicians the music industry.

• Emergency cleanout of toilets

Thousands of people came to Longstone Park on Saturday. It was wonderful to see so many people enjoying themselves. It did mean, however, that there was increased use of the toilets and we had to get them pumped out early on Sunday morning.

Ground mats

In 2023, heavy rainfall meant that the entrance to Longstone Park became a mud bath, causing difficulties for vehicles to get in to set up the stage and the bouncy castle etc. To combat this, we hired ground mats to protect the entrance. Although this was an additional strain of $\pounds 450$ on the budget, it proved to be a necessary expenditure as even with less rainfall this year the ground was still soft and it would have been extremely difficult for vehicles to gain access.

Rubik's Cube competition

We like to try and introduce a new element each year. Thinking about a new 'attraction' we realised that as well as being the 50th anniversary of ABBA's win at the Eurovision Song Contest, it was also the 50th anniversary of the invention of the Rubik's Cube. So we set up a competition on the trailer stage at the bottom of Fore Street. The winner managed to solve the cube in an incredible time of 12 seconds! The competition was a lot of fun and now that we have purchased the cubes, timers and banner the only outlay next year will be the trophy.



Saltash Red Bus

In past years, public service buses have taken a diversion down Glebe Avenue when Fore Street is closed to traffic. This year, the bus companies took the decision not to come down Callington Road or Glebe Avenue at all (and just stick to North Road / New Road). This was great for the traffic flow on Glebe, but we felt that it would make it difficult for people to get to the town centre. We therefore collaborated with the Red Bus to set up two pick up routes. This was a great success, and we are looking to make this a permanent feature of future May Fairs.





PROMOTION OF STC

A GREENER MAY FAIR

Another key element of May Fair 2024 was our intention to use it as a platform to raise awareness of environmental issues.



 Working with Biffa, our waste management contractor, we had extra recycling bins and food waste bins to encourage people to separate waste responsibly.

 Worked with Flotsam Flo, who won a Judges Commendation Award at the 2022 Cornwall Sustainability Awards, asking people to bring in their decommissioned lifejackets to upcycle in to back packs.





• Provided water for dogs, gave information about the water fountain on Fore Street, and encouraged people to bring their own drinks in flasks.
